  - We have connected with each other and the community in many ways:
    - Planning worship together;
    - Grief and healing service in August;
    - Our music ministry;
    - Spirituality and formation;
    - With Zoom, we had the opportunity to see Bishop Diana consecrated;
    - AA, NA, and Al-Anon are meeting here;
    - Volunteers have been taking care of our grounds.
  - \$120,000 has been pledged for 2022. This is 99% of our goal.
  - We’re looking for ways to rent out our extra space and to reach out to the community.
  - We’re discerning projects for the money donated in Richard Martin’s honor.
  - Rev. Sara then thanked the Vestry, Deacon Laurel, Kathy, and the entire congregation.

# MINISTRY TEAM REPORTS

## Building & Grounds

Dennis Pilgrim, Sid Welch & Deborah Dobrenen

Dennis moved which left a vacancy in the Building and Grounds position. I am filling that role on a temporary basis. Vestry is exploring possibilities to maintain our campus into the future.

Repairs this year:

- The parking lot catch basin drain was replaced nearest the labyrinth.
- One exterior water faucet on the building was replaced.
- The electric entry keypads for the parish hall and the exterior office were repaired and brought back online.
- The photocell light above the main church doors was repaired.

Upcoming Repairs

- A roof leak was discovered which caused some water damage in the large classroom downstairs. It was determined that our existing roof above that room is still serviceable with at least 5 years of life remaining so repairs have been scheduled rather than replacement at this time.
- We are obtaining quotes to have our large parking lot security lights repaired. They are inoperable currently.
- Water damage to the downstairs classroom will be repaired.
- The Springwater Studio bathroom will be updated to include removal of one broken toilet.
- The area between the Labyrinth and Memorial Garden will be re-graveled with a walkway between the two spaces added for foot traffic. Additionally, we will add a walkway to the Memorial Garden from the parking lot. We are tracking down bids for that work.
- Hopefully we can have the exterior trim and doors painted (as needed) this year.

### ***Columbarium*** – Deacon Laurel Hart & Jim Hart

After some years of planning by a small church committee, headed by Deacon Laurel Hart, by the spring of 2020, St. Luke's church has made a home for its first columbarium unit and surrounded it with a memorial garden.

Construction also is planned for a physical connection with the church's labyrinth to aid mourners and friends of the deceased whose ashes are inurned in our columbariums.

Constructing the columbarium project included trees, roses and other plants surrounding sites for three 48-niche units with benches for people to rest while remembering their loved ones. The project's landscape was designed by Kathleen Booren of St. Luke's. More plants and trees are being protected through the cold winter months at a local nursery, and will be planted in the spring of 2022.

The project site, located just east of the church buildings, also includes a restored, 7-foot tall St. Luke's Icon, with rock base, that for years was seen by passers-by on Towle Ave.

The design, planned by Terry Olsen of Emerald Stone Masonry, includes creative work with flagstone, concrete and other quarry materials.

Among the challenges with this project were the detailed regulations and protocols the City of Gresham required before approval of the project. Those procedural details and the records of each part of the project were managed by Project Manager Jim Hart, who was in close contact with city officials for more than a year.

Deacon Laurel reports that to date 20 of the 48 niches that were available have been purchased. While some have been filled with remains, others have been purchased in advance of need with partial engraving completed. Plans include the installation of another unit of 48 niches at a time when the current unit has about a dozen niches still available. The third unit of 48 niches would follow in a similar manner when the first two were nearly full.

The St. Luke's Vestry voted last year to allow the current and future rectors to approve for charity burial two niches in each columbarium unit.

This project, Deacon Laurel says, would not have been possible without the dedication of six people who spent many hours during the long hot summer of 2021 keeping water on all of the plants and trees. Deacon Laurel also recognizes the members of her committee, who gathered many times to plan the project and continued to support it during the early phases of its development.

Thanks go out to committee members Maryland and Buzz Busby, Sid Welch, Peggy Long and Laurel and Jim Hart. Kudos also to the long summer maintenance team of Pat Canham, Marcia Chisholm, Bill Dobrenen, Rob Ede, Gale Foresman and Jim Hart.

### ***Labyrinth*** – Judy Bevilacqua & the Labyrinth Guild

The Labyrinth has been on a long Covid “hiatus” preventing the planning of community events, but we continued to pray & plan for 2022. The kiosk remains our faithful Maître D’ to welcome all visitors.

- We took down our Black Lives Matter staging in early 2021, after an appreciative response from many visitors.
- Visitors continued all year to walk, leave prayer requests, notes and to find solace in this space - locally and from Canada, ID, Iowa, NY, CA, MA, WA. etc. ☺
- Terry Olsen continues his good excavation work in the bio-swale area, creating a new meditation space with huge stones and walkways. Stay tuned!
- We were finally able to resume placing our labyrinth brochures in the newly re-opened libraries.
- We find so many comments that say “thank you” for this (quiet, holy, beautiful, safe) space to walk with my (questions, concerns, pain, sadness, joy, gratitude, friends).
- And last...we have been finding some “Gracias notes” from our local Hispanic/Latinx friends who have discovered this space belongs to them too.

**Care Team**

These shawls have been sent to a number of places within the United States, Canada, Alaska and one was sent to Kenya.

Prior to the outbreak of Covid-19 our group would meet one Saturday per month at Springwater Studio from 10 o'clock until noon chatting over cups of coffee and enjoying fellowship as we did our knitting and crocheting. We haven't met since February 2020 but production has not slowed the progress of our dedicated and talented members.

"Time For Us", St. Luke's weekly opportunity to provide support for anyone wishing to feel heard, share a burden, exclaim a joy, work through grief, or any other human emotion, meets weekly, Tuesday at NOON, for lunch and conversation. The goal of the group is to be a stable, safe, confidential moment for all. During 2021, 18 people used the group for support. It has met both on ZOOM and in person, as conditions have dictated.

**Children & Youth**

## **Finance Team**

The role of the finance committee is primarily to provide financial oversight for St. Luke's. St. Luke's committee made up of four members. Rev. Sara, Marci Welch, Stephen Achilles and Jim Stumpf. We meet monthly to discuss the finances of the church. Marci Welch provides the monthly Profit and Loss and Balance Sheet for the review of the committee.

Primary Functions of the Committee:

- Develop an annual operating budget.
- Approve the budget within the finance committee.
- Present Budget to the Vestry for final approval.
- Monitor adherence to the budget on a monthly basis.
- Set long-range financial goals.
- Oversee our invested funds
- Present to the Vestry monthly reports, make recommendations and point out any financial change for their final approval.

Pre Covid-19 we would meet in person in Sara's office and now we meet monthly via ZOOM, which for the most part works fine. We discuss what our income is for the month and also go over our spending, bill paying, bank accounts, savings and investment accounts.

### ***Audit***

It had been several years since St. Luke's had a formal audit. We had plans to Audit Swap information with another Episcopal Church, but Covid-19 forced us to cancel this exchange numerous times during 2021. After many delays we made the decision to hire an outside firm to provide us with a professional audit in 2021. The final audit report stated that our financial statements are in accordance with Episcopal church guidelines. The audit did recommend some minor operational changes and the committee will speak with the auditor to better understand these changes.

### ***Investment Funds***

During the last year we spent a significant amount of time on our investments. We now receive regular statements and have merged our short term invested funds with our long term funds to increase our expected returns. As of December 31, 2021, our invested funds totalled \$261,450.

### ***Pledging***

As you know we have a community of wonderful parishioners at St. Luke's and without their generous gifts we would be in a financial struggle. Our preliminary Budget for 2022 was \$155,000, an increase of \$20,000 pledged in 2021, which would allow our community to increase Rev. Sara's current hours from 32.5 to 35 hours, working toward paying at 40 hours in the next few years. In addition, this budget would support an increase for our office staff and pay the increase in our Diocesan Assessment (DPA).



## **Convention Report**

On November 6, 2021, the 133rd Annual Convention of the Diocese was held via Zoom. Rev. Sara, Deacon Laurel and I represented St. Luke. Presiding over this, her first convention, was Bishop Diana Akiyama.

Following are the highlights of the convention:

- Elections of Committees. Our own Rev. Sara Cosca-Warfield was elected to the Diocesan Council, Clergy.
- Resolutions passed were;
  - Substitute Resolution: Affirming Gender- Diverse and Trans Identities. This is replacing a 2012 resolution.
  - Dissolutions(Closings of parish) of Christ the King, Stayton,Or. and St. David Episcopal, Drain. This matter is always a very heart wrenching vote.
  - The support of St. Timothy's Brookings in their efforts to feed the hungry by letter, to protest the actions by the City of Brookings.
  - Passing of the budget.

It has been a pleasure to serve as your delegate the past two years. I have also served as a delegate in the past. I would encourage you to consider this position for St. Luke.
